- There are over 350 different careers within the NHS
- There are over 30,000 NHS staff working across Surrey with a further 33,000 professionals working within social care.
- Over 12,000 staff work in non-clinical roles this includes administrative functions, HR, finance, communications, IT, engineering and other corporate services.

Apprenticeships

There are a wide range of apprenticeships now available across health and social care in both clinical and non clinical areas. This includes roles such as:

- Administration
- IT
- Dental assistant
- Laboratory technician
- Nursing
- Paramedic
- Pharmacy technician

Salaries

A healthcare assistant or porter may start on £17, 652. A nurse, radiographer or physiotherapist may earn from £24,214. There are many progression opportunities depending on how far you wish to progress. For example a psychologist or chief nurse may earn up to £73,939.

Operating Department Practitioners support patients during surgery, they assist with pre-op assessments, prepare equipment for surgery and provide instruments to the surgeon during procedures. They assess and monitor patients during the recovery stage.

Occupational Therapists work with people of all ages, in hospitals, in the community, and in schools. They work with people who have difficulties carrying out tasks because of disability, illness, trauma, ageing and a range of long term conditions. They may help someone adapt to life after surgery or help people stay in their own home by providing adaptions and equipment.
