The Government introduced Pupil Premium in 2011-2012. This funding was given to support students from low income families who are known to be eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) and students who have been in care continuously for more than six months (LAC). In 2012-2013 this was extended to include students who have been eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years (Ever6). Schools are free to spend their allocation how they see fit, but are held accountable by the Government for how it is used and are required to publish on line how the additional funds are used. This will ensure that parents and others are made

aware of the attainment of students covered by the Pupil Premium and the extra support they receive. At SJB all groups of students make exceptional progress.

At SJB we recognise that not all students who receive free school meals are disadvantaged and that some students who are disadvantaged/vulnerable are not registered or do not qualify for free school meals. We therefore allocate the Pupil Premium funding to support any student or group of students who are vulnerable or who are identified as a priority by the school's tracking processes and pastoral systems.

The Pupil Premium funding is used to support the following activities/items:

1. Additional small group and one-to-one English language and phonics intervention support delivered by highly experienced and specialist staff;
2. Additional small group maths support introduced for targeted students;
3. Literacy resources and early literacy intervention;
4. Revision materials and resources purchased and disseminated;
5. Curriculum resources and support materials including revision guides, school equipment, music tuition and costs for extra-curricular activities as well as trips;
6. Costs for careers advice, mentor visits and aspiration events;
7. Mentoring;
8. Enrolment on alternative courses for KS4 students, where applicable;
9. Provision of an iPad, with full insurance and Apps that can be used both in school and at home.

We continually review the best means to improve the achievement of all our students with special regard to those who are disadvantaged or vulnerable in any way.

The Government introduced the Service Pupil Premium (SPP) in 2011-2012 in recognition of the specific challenges children from service families face and as part of the commitment to delivering the armed forces covenant.

State schools, academies and free schools in England, which have children of service families in school years Reception to Year 11, can receive the SPP funding. It is designed to assist the school in providing the additional support that these children may need and is currently worth £300 per service child who meets the eligibility criteria.

At SJB we recognise that not all students who receive SPP funding require the additional pastoral support and that some students who vulnerable are not registered or do not qualify for additional SPP or PP funding. We therefore allocate the all Service Pupil Premium funding to support any student or group of students who are vulnerable or who are identified as a priority by the school's pastoral systems.

The SPP funding is used to support the following activities:

1. Counselling and additional pastoral care;

2. Costs for careers advice, mentor visits and aspiration events;
3. Mentoring;
4. Support for new students joining the school part-way through the year.
